

## What is Smart Start?

Smart Start is North Carolina's nationally-recognized initiative to ensure that every child reaches his or her potential and is prepared to succeed in a global community. Smart Start helps working parents pay for child care, improves the quality of child care and provides health and family support services in every North Carolina county. Started in 1993, Smart Start was an innovative solution to help address the state wide issue that children were coming to school unprepared to learn.

Policymakers recognized that progress would require tapping into the same innovative spirit that inspired private sector advances, and therefore, established Smart Start as a public/private partnership. Independent, private organizations work in all 100 North Carolina counties through The North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., and 75 Local Partnerships. The power of Smart Start is that it delivers outcomes by giving communities local control to determine the best approach to achieving them. Alliance for Children serves as the Smart Start local partnership in Union County.

## How Does Alliance for Children Impact the Community

Education doesn't begin when a child enters kindergarten. Education begins at birth. 90% of brain development occurs in the first 2000 days of life making this time critical to the shape and structure of the brain.

Alliance for Children advocates and invests in efforts that strengthen children's health, education, and emotional development by bringing together all the people involved in a young child's life. Families, teachers, doctors, caregivers and many additional support givers working together to ensure that every child has all they need for healthy growth and development.

Because today's children are tomorrow's leaders, parents and workers, -everyone has a stake in making sure that all children have the experiences they need to thrive

## FAMILY SUPPORT ACHIEVEMENTS



Served 57 parents.

**Parenting Support and Nurturing Parent Program** 

• 89% of parents completed all 12 sessions

• Provided incentives for 47 participants

522 Individual counseling meetings

- Completed 6 written health care plans for children with special needs
- Had a combined 591 center contacts (phone, email or visit)
- Conducted 6 child oriented training sessions within the child care classroom




#### **Breastfeeding Support:**

- Assisted 830 women initiate breastfeeding
- 393 attended virtual prenatal breastfeeding class
- 911 women in Union County were served by peer counselors
- Hosted the first Big Latch event in person with 16 attendees
- Distributed \$21,377 in Non-Cash Grants

## SYSTEM SUPPORT ACHIEVEMENTS

#### **Community Education**

- 33, 808 hits to the website and 171 social media posts
- 271 hours of volunteer time
- 4 community presentations to build community relations
- 6 community outreach events to serve the children and families in Union County
- Initiated the Book Library in local laundry mats



## EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION ACHIEVEMENTS

#### **Education Stars:**

- Advised and enrolled 139 Students
- Provided Advising for 30 child care facilities with 39 site visits
- 2 Students received Certificates in Early Childhood Education
- 2 students received a Degree in Early Childhood Education
- Alliance for Children paid for classes for 6 students

#### **Smart Start Resource Library:**

- 52 New Memberships
- 23 Annual Renewals
- 114 visitors
- 554 visits in total
- Initiated a new delivery service pilot program to deliver materials to Union County Child Care centers.





#### **Pre-K MASTERS**

- Trained 32 staff members
- Provided 6 Educational trainings with 115 total in attendance
- Conducted 200 site visits
- Assisted 3 classrooms with intensive ECERS support
- Distributed \$21,377 in Non-Cash Grants

#### **Smart Start MASTERS**

- Trained 143 Union County Child Care teachers
- Provided 9 Community Wide Educational trainings
- Intensively worked with 5 child care facilities, 11 classes and 14 staff
- Distributed \$36,000 in Non-cash grants for new classroom materials
- Provided general support to 17 child care facilities, 7 classes and 14 staff

#### **Inclusion Support**

- Trained 81 Union County Child Care teachers
- Provided 7 Community Wide Educational trainings
- Intensively worked with 6 child care facilities and 11 staff
- Provided general support to 10 child care facilities, 17 classes and 34 staff
- Conducted 224 site visit
- Distributed \$7, 940 in Non-Cash Grants to the 6 Intensive sites







## **Dolly Parton Imagination Library**

In collaboration with the Dolly Parton Imagination Library (DPIL), Alliance for Children provides free books to Union County children mailed to the them each month until the age of 5.

- For 2022-23 DPIL served 8,069 children in Union County
- 76,837 books were mailed to children 0-5 in Union County
- Since 2017, Alliance for Children has provided funding for 303,596 books to be mailed to registered children within our community

## North Carolina Pre-Kindergarten

The NC Pre-Kindergarten program is designed to prepare at-risk 4-year-olds for success in school and is free for qualified families.

- For 2022-23, NCPK served 331 children
- 46 teachers were trained in curriculum, data collection and Early Childhood Environmental Rating Scales (ECERS)
- 23 classes in elementary schools and private child care centers provided high quality early education to the eligible students
- Through data collection during the year, teachers were able to provide information to the parents and the kindergarten teachers



## Farm to Early Childhood Education

Farm to ECE offers increased access to healthy local food, gardening opportunities and food-based activities to enhance the quality of the educational experience in early childhood education.



- Collaborated with two centers to build gardens and activities
- Held 12 community meetings in partnership with NC Cooperative Extension
- Participated in NC Crunch with centers to focus on apple growing in North Carolina
- Held information sessions for new centers to enroll in the program

## WAGE\$

The Child Care WAGE\$ Program provides child care professionals with education-based salary supplements. These supplements reward education and continuity of care which in turn benefits the children by providing a more stable relationship with better educated teachers.

- \$77,500 was directly released to the teachers in our community
- 46 child care professionals were issued supplements
- WAGE\$ supplements impacted 15 centers
- \$981 average six month supplement
- 100% of the survey results stated that WAGE\$ supplements encourage them to remain with their current center

## **Union County Christmas Parade**

The 69th Annual Union County Christmas Parade was held with over 150 entries and thousands in attendance. Supported by over 75 volunteers who helped with traffic, entry placement and more.

On November 3rd we crowned Kristen Baucom of Piedmont High School the Parade Princes at the Shops at Nottingham. Erika Quintero from Monroe High School received the Spirit Award.

## **Community Events**

- Monroe Fall Festival children were able to pick out a book along with parents learning more about Alliance for Children
- Monroe Easter Eggstravanza children received a bag with books and information about how reading and physical activity builds brains. Children were able to complete a craft that encouraged physical activity.
- Downtown Art Walk with the Union County Arts Council partnered with young children to display their art for participants to enjoy.
- Juneteenth Celebration in Marshville where over 800 books were given to children while parents learned about programs that could benefit their children.










